Today the Church celebrates the life and work of Charles Eugene de Foucauld. He was born in 1858 and grew up to become an officer in the cavalry. In 1883 he went on an expedition to Morocco where he developed a passion for North Africa and its ways. Four years later he returned to the Catholic faith and, after a pilgrimage to the Holy Land, became a trappiest monk in 1890. Desiring an even more austere life, he left in 1897 and became a servant to the Poor Clares in Jerusalem and Nazareth. He was eventually ordained priest in 1901 and went to live as a hermit in Algeria, ending up at Tamanrasset. He became fluent in the local language and his care and concern for the local tribes-people made him accepted and then much-loved by his followers
